The MTCSF staff presents 2021 Leadership Recognition Awards to Recipients

The MTCSF staff placed the final touches on the 2021 Statewide Trauma System Symposium by personally presenting the winner's leadership awards.

Amber Kyle, director of trauma services, received the Mississippi Trauma Care System Foundation's 2021 Red Tulip Award for Exceptional Trauma Service during a May 18 ceremony at the School of Nursing.

The honor recognizes trauma program managers who have made a significant and sustained contribution to the Mississippi trauma system of care.

According to the foundation, Kyle has been instrumental in educating and training trauma

care professionals statewide and improving systems of care to meet national standards.

The broken red tulip, adopted by the American Trauma Society, symbolizes the pain, suffering, and lifestyle changes caused by traumatic injury.

The award came as the nation observed National Trauma Awareness Month in May.

John Gardner, director of trauma systems for the foundation, and his team lauded Kyle during the ceremony.

"It's important that our Level I trauma centers are recognized, and this award couldn't go to a better person," Gardner said. "Amber has made significant contributions to the Mississippi trauma system."

"The Mississippi Trauma Care System was the state's first formal system of care and is designed to provide patients with traumatic injuries the best chance for survival and recovery," said Dr. Jonathan Wilson, UMMC chief administrative officer. "Amber being recognized as the recipient of the inaugural Red Tulip Award is reflective of the tireless effort she has poured into the trauma system over her career."

"This award is significant for both her work here at UMMC leading our trauma program, as well as the work she does at the state and national levels to improve the care of patients injured by traumatic events."

Forrest General Hospital is proud to have affiliations with two of the state's three winners in this year's recognition of outstanding trauma leaders. A.A.A. Ambulance Chief Executive Officer, Chuck Carter, and retired F.G.H. Trauma Surgeon, Kate Aseme, M.D., were recognized during the May meeting of the Forrest Health Board of Trustees by representatives with the Mississippi Trauma Care System Foundation, on behalf of the

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Mississippi State Department of Health Bureau of Acute Care Systems.

"We are here to recognize two exceptional individuals chosen by members of the statewide trauma care system to receive recognition as the finale to our 2021 Mississippi Trauma Symposium," said John Gardner, MTCSF Director.

Duncan Donald, MD, medical director for Trauma and Surgical Services at Forrest General and who serves as chairperson for the Mississippi Trauma Advisory Board of Directors, said it was "quite an honor for Forrest General personnel, both past, and present, to be recognized with these prestigious statewide awards."

Kate Aseme, M.D., was awarded the Legacy Award for Lifetime Achievement in Trauma. This award recognizes an individual (current or retired) who has demonstrated dedication to the development and ongoing support of the Mississippi Trauma System of Care. The award recognizes a distinguished career and visionary leadership dedicated to preventing injuries, advancement in trauma care, and a lifelong commitment to the care of trauma patients.

Aseme was a trailblazer in the world of surgery and trauma. As a female surgeon, she came to Mississippi in 1977 and, thus, became the state's first female African-American general surgeon. She practiced surgery at Forrest General until her retirement in 2015. As a founding member of Forrest General's trauma program, which was established in 1998 and became one of the first community-hospital-based trauma programs in the Southeast, her work and others led to the hospital's Level II trauma center designation.

"Here at Forrest General Hospital, we are fortunate to have two such dedicated and outstanding professionals who have helped shape and drive the trauma program," Donald said. "Dr. Aseme has long been a leader in the trauma system, not only locally but also statewide. She has been an architect of a quality trauma system, and her contributions to its arowth have been immeasurable. Chuck Carter has been a long-time employee at A.A.A. Ambulance Service, serves on several state trauma committees, and is widely recognized for his ongoing commitment to the excellence of Mississippi's trauma program. We are lucky to have been blessed with the work of these two to help treat injuries and save lives of patients throughout the Pine Belt area. I am honored for the opportunity to have worked with both of these illustrious individuals."

All award recipients received a trophy identifying their award and a signed painting by Daniel Sundahl, a firefighter, paramedic, and artist. Carter's artwork reflects the life of Emergency Medical Service, Aseme's reflects life as a trauma surgeon, and Kyle's reflects life as a trauma nurse.


With a focus on compassionate care and exceptional service, Regional One Health is anchored by its acute care hospital, Regional Medical Center, which is home to four highly respected Centers of Excellence, including trauma, burn, neonatal intensive care, and high-risk obstetrics. The Regional One Health family of services also expands beyond the Regional Medical Center to provide a full range of health and wellness services throughout West Tennessee, East Arkansas, and North Mississippi to as far as a five-state region.

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Regional One Health is a Level 1 trauma for a large area. The impact on Mississippians is illustrated by the map below.



Regional One Health's contributions to Mississippi trauma patients are substantial. In data provided by the facility during our visit, 25,067 Mississippi patients were treated during the period 2020 – May 2021 to ROH. 1,953 Inpatients and 23,106 Outpatients. Of that total were 192 Burn and 1,131 Trauma trauma patients. 390 transferred from referring facility, and 864 transported from the scene.

The MTCSF values the contributions of Regional One Health. Uniquely, they are providing Rural Trauma Team Development Course (RTTDC) and Advanced Trauma Care for Nurses (ATCN) for Mississippi.
