The Symposium has offerings for all trauma care team members: Emergency Medical Services, Trauma Medical Directors, Trauma Program Managers, Trauma Registrar, Trauma Surgeons, Emergency Physicians, Trauma Advance Professional, Practice and others supporting pre-hospital and trauma center staff.

Program Overview

The "Leading the Way: Outcomes over Obstacles" Mississippi Trauma Symposium offers participants opportunity to assemble as a statewide team. Speakers are selected to present past benefits and ongoing work to mature the trauma system of care, focusing on achieving the best outcomes navigating obstacles. The 2022 theme will highlight the benefits of the Mississippi Trauma System of Care.

Pre-Conference Agenda

Tuesday, May 3, 2022

The Mississippi Trauma Care System Foundation, in conjunction with the Mississippi State Department of Health, Bureau of Acute Care Systems, is pleased to facilitate two one-day courses on Tuesday, May 3, 2022. These courses are free of charge to the registered students.

Option 1 - ABLS



The Advanced Burn Life Support program is the ABA's premier educational

resource for the emergency care of burn injuries. This course will be virtual with an in-person checkoff by the Firefighters



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Burn Center of Regional One Health staff at the MSU-Riley Center. Registration is limited to the first thirty (30) registrants.

Option 2 - Rural TOPIC

The Rural TOPIC course is taught in a oneday online interactive Modular Format, customized to best meet the needs of the individual trauma care provider participants who have varying levels of experience with trauma performance

improvement. The course offers practical application for level 3 and 4 trauma centers



from smaller communities with low volume or rural settings. The modules focus on didactic, operational definitions, sample tools, case study examples, and take-home points. Amber Kyle, BSN, MSN, RN, the TOPIC Committee Chair, will lead this course. Registration is limited to the first forty (40) registrants.

This four-day event is a comprehensive opportunity, learning with inspiring presentations from Mississippi trauma survivors. The agenda includes speakers from all in-state and out-of-state Level I trauma centers and our Level II in-state hospitals. A two-day cadaver lab will provide critical hands-on experience. State **EMS** leaders are planning breakouts. Registrars can receive eight hours of trauma registry training in a live The Mississippi State computer lab. Department of Health Bureau of Acute Care Services representatives will provide information on the current and future state of the trauma system. Dr. Duncan Donald is hosting a panel presentation with representatives from pre-hospital care and the trauma center team. Hospital Mississippi Association representatives will update initiatives to address the staffing shortages and teach attendees how to become effective advocates for the trauma system of care.

The opening night reception at the Mississippi Arts and Entertainment Experience will be unforgettable. Vendors will be on-hand to showcase the latest innovations in trauma care. Thursday night's banquet will include an awards ceremony.



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The symposium, including the ABLS and Rural Topics courses, are provided at no cost to individuals working in the Mississippi Trauma System of Care. The Mississippi State Department of Health Bureau of Acute Care Systems makes available educational funding to the Mississippi Trauma System of Care.

Individuals wanting to attend the symposium but not a participant in the MS Trauma System of Care (includes agency employees, veterans' hospital employees, non-designated hospitals, for example) may attend these educational events at the cost of \$300. When registering, select "Out-of-State and Non-MS Trauma System Participants."

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Legacy Award for Lifetime Achievement

Recognizes an individual (current, retired, who has posthumously) proven the development and dedication to ongoing support of the Mississippi Trauma System of Care. In recognition of a distinguished career and visionary leadership dedicated to the prevention of injuries, advancement in trauma care, and lifelong commitment to the care of trauma patients.

The Rising Star Award

Please up-and-coming Recognize an who trauma professional has demonstrated leadership and passion for trauma patients in their contributions to the trauma population. The nominee may include a physician, nurse, registrar, EMS staff, ambulance services & center executives, or any other healthcare professional who has gone above and beyond for trauma-centered care.

The Red Tulip Award for Exceptional Trauma Service:

The broken *red tulip*, adopted by the American Trauma Society (ATS), symbolizes the pain, suffering, and lifestyle change caused by traumatic injury. This award recognizes a nursing professional who demonstrates the goal of keeping the tulip strong, straight, and

unaffected by trauma. Nominate a trauma professional in the field of nursing who has made a significant and sustained contribution to the Mississippi Trauma System of Care on a local, district, and State level.

Circle of Excellence Award - highlighting survivor stories and the best of the MS Trauma System of Care.

The Circle of Excellence Award, new this year, aligns with the mission of the Mississippi Trauma Care System to build and support a statewide system that provides superior care starting when the injury is detected and continuing through definitive treatment while striving to decrease injury and death from trauma. The award may highlight survivor stories and the best of the Mississippi Trauma System of Care.

Please help us recognize the trauma team that promotes excellent patient care through effective communication, true collaboration, decision making, critical thinking, the ability to address challenges related to patient care, and advocacy for the trauma patient. A survivor story will highlight a team that exhibits dedication to the statewide trauma system model and shows passion in the steps they take to treat trauma patients. This award could include a mass casualty response or a pre-recorded video highlighting a positive

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outcome. A team may consist of staff from some or all of the following contact points: first Responders, ground ambulance, air ambulance, trauma centers (ER, surgical, etc.), transfer team, higher level of care center, and rehabilitation.

When you have your nominee in mind and the reasons for your nomination, you are ready to submit your nominations. To make your nominations, you must complete the survey monkey. The awards are an excellent opportunity to recognize your co-worker, facility, and success. To encourage you to submit nominations via the SurveyMonkey link, we will enter your name into a \$100 gift card drawing. We will accept nominations until February 28, 2022. The winners are announced at the 2nd Annual Mississippi Trauma Symposium on May 5, 2022.
