The education was provided by the USA Health University Hospital team, including Dr. Ashley Williams, M.D., Assistant Professor, Department of Surgery, Division of Trauma, Acute Care Surgery & Burns, Dr. Nathan Polite D.O. Trauma /Emergency General Surgeon, Assistant Professor of Surgery, and Andrew Haiflich, MBA, MSN, RN Director, Trauma Services.

The host hospital was Thomasville Regional Medical Center in Thomasville, AL.

The course is developed around a threemember team in a rural setting. The minimum three members are the leader (Physician or APP), a Registered Nurse, and a third member, that may be an RN, ancillary clinical staff, or clerk. The most successful course requires two or three members from the same hospital to participate in the training. The USA Health University staff has agreed to teach this course in Mississippi if we can get team participation. The Level IV physician leader is essential to a successful course and team development.


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The MTCSF knows RTTDC is an excellent course to save lives through better patient care and faster appropriate transfer decisions. With increasing trauma centers staffing Licensed Practical Nurses and Paramedics, the student will learn their roles in the trauma team.

Question 1

A 65-year-old woman is being brought to the emergency department of a rural facility by Emergency Medical Services following a fall down a flight of stairs. Upon arrival, she has a seizure and then becomes unresponsive. To be most effective, the team leader in this situation must do all of the following EXCEPT:

- a) Assign tasks/responsibilities

Question 3

A 25-year-old male was involved in a high-speed, single-vehicle crash. He is brought to a 25-bed, critical care access hospital with no surgical capability. His blood pressure is 70/30, heart rate is 135, respiratory rate is 45, and he is unresponsive verbal stimuli. An to emergency medical technician is manually ventilating the patient with a bag-valve mask. The patient's neck veins are flat with no associated tracheal deviation. Initial auscultation of the chest reviews absent breath sounds on the right, along with dullness to percussion. There is no penetrating The obvious trauma. diagnosis related to the thorax is:

- a) Open pneumothorax
- b) Flail chest
- c)Tension pneumothorax
- d) Massive hemothorax

Baptist Memorial Hospital North Mississippi

Stop the Bleed Instructors Cassie McCutchen, Emily Smith, and Swayze

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Gardner from Baptist Memorial Hospital North in Oxford held two Stop the Bleed classes for local school faculty and federal employees. Trauma Program Manager Cassie McCutchen reports that 84 Water Valley School District participants were trained. In addition, the team provided the two school nurses with Baptist bags that were supplied with tourniquets, gloves, and gauze.



On October 11, the trio trained an additional 46 participants at the Federal Building in Oxford.

Newton County Elementary School Offers Faculty Stop the Bleed Education

MTCSF partnered with Newton County Elementary School to provide Stop the Bleed training to 114 elementary school faculty, staff, and the Decatur, MS, police department.

The training was spearheaded by Todd Brown, a school bus driver, deputy sheriff, and medic. The event incorporated school faculty, local police, deputies, and school

officers. MTCSF resource provided certificates. Anderson Regional Medical Center provided tourniquet kits in memory of Dr. William A. Billups, Jr. Tracy Laird, Director of Nursing at Ochsner-Laird Hospital, provided bandage material and protective gloves. Jason Roberson, Principal of Newton County strongly advocates Elementary, for teacher education that may save a student's life. Patty Gibson, the school nurse, participated in the program and will support ongoing education.
