The Mississippi Trauma System of Care Symposium has confirmed the venue, date, theme, and tentative agenda. The symposium planning committee has been working hard. More information will be becomes rollina out as it available. Registration will begin in January 2024. agenda is exciting, and the educational offerings blend our most requested topics and new programs that have not been offered before. MTCSF will continue the recognition and awards to trauma leaders statewide, as nominated by their peers.

Tuesday, April 23, 2024, preworkshop symposium with three breakouts. We will host the AAAM AIS15 on-site course for our Level I-III trauma center staff for the first time. The course is conducted over two (2) days facilitated in person by AAAM faculty. There will be a registration cost for this course. For the first time, we will host Tactical Emergency Casualty Care (TECC) for our MS-licensed Emergency Medical Services staff. Cadaver labs are third track for offered as a emergency procedures. We are adding a Mock Trial activity for those not in the AAAM or TECC courses. After or before you attend a cadaver lab, you can learn by hearing a trauma case on trial and identifying how to provide unquestionable patient care.

Wednesday, April 24, 2024, the AAAM course will continue. TECC, a one-day **course,** will be offered to a second group of students. Two Cadaver labs will be reserved for medical staff providers AirCare advanced only. will teach emergency procedures for physicians and advanced practice professionals on day two of the Cadaver lab. We will open a fourth track to provide Registry training, an eight-hour course to meet annual training requirements. Instructors provide certificates for each course completed.

Thursday, April 24, 2024, will unite everyone in general sessions. The morning

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sessions will drill down on the lessons learned during the Rolling Fork Tornado beginning the night of March 24, 2023. Plans are to discuss the initial and secondary response starting at ground zero and including representatives at every level of the trauma system of care. Tornado preparedness is an excellent format for hospital administrators and care providers. The students will learn from people directly involved.

importantly, Most students be provided substantive actions ready for implementation and the emerging goals to be better prepared for the next event. We will have a mobile hospital and other outside exhibits. In the afternoon, we will have updates from the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH, BACS). Fernando Gomez, MD, speaks on Pediatric Readiness. The symposium will conclude with a trauma panel of experts' case studies led by our State Medical Director. As you plan for 2024, you will not want to miss this event. Mark your calendar today and make your plans to attend.

The project is developed to help local juveniles gain a unique insight into the consequences of gun violence through education. 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
